A lot of erosion along the riverbank has invaded into where the treeline is.

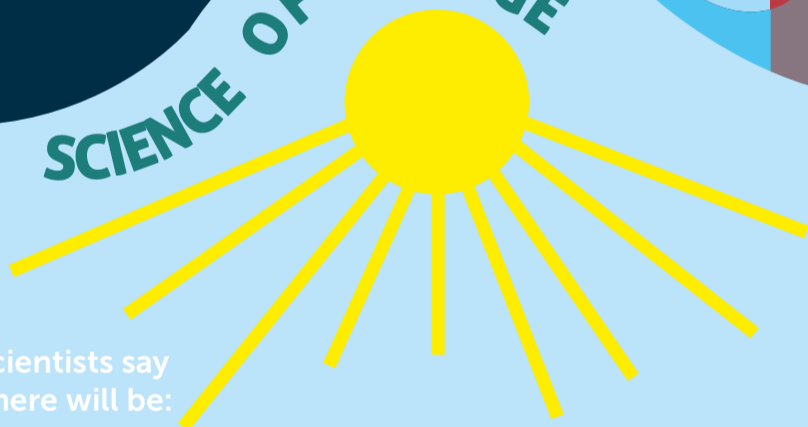
Our beach, it's different. Once upon a time it was right up, now it's right up near the road. It is changing.
