Pfizer will be offered to all residents over 12 years old and will be conducted at the **Community Hall**.

If you have not already received your first dose you can still receive it in October or attend the Cooktown Clinic.

If you are a frontline service worker, you are required to get vaccinated. If you are unsure about the vaccine and/or the requirements, please contact a health professional to discuss.

My grandfather Alec Creek is a Kaanju man from Coen and my grandmother is Kuku Nyungkul from Shipton Flat. I have lived in Wujal Wujal for 16 years and have just been making artwork for a few years now at our art centre. I love it because some of my family members encourage me to do artwork. I have artists from both sides of my family.

Meaning of the Mili Series

My painting depicts my totem, the Mili, Stinging Tree (Dendrocnide moroides). My grandmother is from Wujal Wujal where the Stinging Tree is known as Mili and my grandfather is from Coen where it is known as Appun. The stinging tree has leaves which stings when you have contact with it, the leaves have hairs which gets stuck to your skin if touched. The best medicine to use if you get sting is tobacco or you own urine.

To keep the park and infrastructure in good order we ask if everyone can do their part to keep the area clean and tidy to avoid any unnecessary closures.




- **Supervision of children is required at all times**
- Ensure that no sand or grass goes onto the park as this could block up the filtration system.
- No standing on the benches or BBQ's.
- Take all rubbish and scraps with you. Clean up after yourself.
- No wet towels on the BBQ's.
- Clean the BBQ after use.
- Don't move or alter any of the fence panels.
- Only Authorised people to enter the filtration shed.
- Don't throw any items in the bucket.
- No balls on the splash pad for children's safety.
- No food or drink inside the park
- If children are not toilet trained swim nappies are required.
- Enjoy yourself, have fun and cool down.

ILUA LAND TRANSFER

Key Points

- Native title had already been established over the land, but the traditional custodians wanted more involvement
- Eastern Kuku Yalanji people will jointly manage the country with the Queensland government and say it will lead to cultural learning and employment opportunities
- About 20 per cent of the 160,213ha handed back comes in addition to the land already under native title

What the ILUA Transfer means to bama

The ILUA transfer celebrates the return of the Daintree, Ngalbulal, Hope Islands and Kalkajaka National Parks (Cape Your Peninsula Aboriginal Land) back to the Eastern Kuku Yalanji people. This land is the spiritual land of which our ancestors were the caretakers and our history began many hundreds of years ago. This land provided our people with food, medicine, stories and sacred areas to conduct men's and women's business. This land sustained and enriched our people and the stories and knowledge have been passed down from generation to generation to create and celebrate our unique culture. Every bama is spiritually connected to this bubu.

By accepting the return of this land we will be able to keep our connection to country, manage our land and continue to build our cultural story which we can pass on to our kids, their kids and so on.

I would personally like to thank and congratulate every individual that has been involved in the process to get us to this point and create history for our people. It gives me a great sense of pride to know that our clans culture is strong, and we can work together to achieve great outcomes that will enrich the lives of our people and the generations to follow.

An ILUA is a voluntary agreement between native title parties and other people or bodies about the use and management of areas of land and/or waters.



Rivermount Christian College

A group of 18 students from Rivermount Christian College, Gold Coast made their way to Wujal to participate in a two week on country program to show city kids how we do it in community. The camp was a massive success and the Wujal Youth Justice Program would like to thank all community members who assisted over the two weeks and extend their appreciation to the staff that dedicated their time to look after all the students.

It was a great to spend time with members of the three clan groups on country and joining in on all the activities such as the Ocean Safari reef trip, horse riding, yarning circle, touch football, fishing, hiking, swimming. Kurrma, corroboree and much much more.

The group learnt about the local Kuku Yalanji culture and traditions and by the end of the fortnight the city kids were well adapted to Wujal life and didn't want to leave. The aim of the program is to get our kids out on country and show the city kids what community life is like.

Next year it is our turn to visit Rivermount Christian College on the Gold Coast and experience what life is like in the big smoke.

The Wujal Youth Justice Program will again host the Rivermount Christian College in 2023 to show a new group of kids just how great we have it up here and share our culture and community with them.

The Wujal Youth Justice Program would like to thank all the Wujal kids who attended and thank them for all the effort and participation they provided over the two weeks.



Youth Justice Camp

Rivermount Christian College has a total of 1004 students and runs an Indigenous Awareness Program as part of its curriculum. The program explores cultures, spirituality, histories and recognition of the contributions Indigenous Australians have made to contemporary Australia.





Helen and Graeme Teece wrote to Hershbergers and they were very excited to hear of life in Wujal Wujal.


They wrote:

Hank is 98 and I am 86, so we don't do a lot beyond reading and keeping our recliners occupied. Our daughter Carol and her husband John Berthelette live with us in our basement. They were in Central African Republic but are home now because of covid. They still work remotely; skype and zoom are terrific, but they have trouble quite a bit with poor internet connections in CAR. Carol is a translation consultant and is working with the translation committees in CAR, but it is often slow and frustrating because of poor connections. John and Carol planted a garden and we've been enjoying the fresh produce. She has canned quite a few quarts of tomatoes and has frozen green beans and green peppers and chard. So at least I can help with that with the cutting up and anything that needs doing while sitting down. Hank still does some fixup things, works on the tires on our car and anything he can do sitting down. He doesn't drive any more, but I still do so I am his chauffeur. I don't think you knew any of our kids. Besides Carol, we have two sons. Danny lives with his family in Florida; Steve lives about 7 miles from us, so we see him a lot.

Please tell the bama there that we think of them often and pray for them.
